Prayers of the Sick: Please note that as from February 2014 our practice is to leave names on the sick list for a month. To extend the time, please make personal contact with the Parish Office.

The original audiences of the Gospel of Matthew were mainly Jewish Christians who were still deeply attached to the Jewish Law and customs. As a result, one of the thrusts in Matthew was concerning the Law – Torah. Matthew attempts to present as a new Moses. Both went up on to a mountain to teach and both talked there about the Law.

At the heart of Jewish Law, there are 613 commandments / *mitzvot* which God gave to the Jewish people in the first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures, or the Torah. Interestingly 613 consist of 365 negative (do not) and 248 positive (do) commands. Pharisees are good people who follow the Torah strictly.

One of the biggest challenges for any devout Pharisee is to interpret the Law. As a result, they have created many other customs and rituals with the good intention to cover the boundary of the Law. That means before you can violate a command you must have violated these customs and rituals first. Jesus criticises his countrymen for their interpretation of the Law, they make human life, especially the ordinary people more burdensome rather than less: “They tie up heavy burdens, hard to bear, and lay them on the shoulders of others; but themselves are unwilling to lift a finger to move them... or you tithe mint, dill, and cumin, and have neglected the weightier matters of the law: justice and mercy and faith.” (Mt 23) Fr Byrne reflects, “God did not give the Torah to Israel to impose or add to the burdens of the human race but rather to function as a way of enlightenment.” Jesus’ primary concerns are with the heart and the spirit of the Law. “It is in the context of being an interpreter of the Torah in this sense that Jesus claims that *his* yoke is easy and *his* burden light.” (p96)

So the heavy loads which the scribes and Pharisees put on others (Mt 23) are effectively replaced by the teaching of Jesus. He does this as the gentle and humble of heart who fulfils all justice and mercy, acting side by side with sinners to bring them into communion with himself. (Sloyan 113) The early teaching of the Apostles, *Didache* 6,2 comforts us even more: “If you can bear the entire yoke of the Lord, you will be perfect; but if you are not able to, then do what you can.”

“All who labour and are overburdened” are ordinary people, “unlettered as regards interpretation of the Torah, who labour under such burdensome rulings.” (p96) Jesus offers these ordinary people rest. Fr Byrne reflects deeply on *rest*: “The rest Jesus promises to the burdened is not simply respite in a general kind of way...In a biblical traditional God’s resting on the 7th day following the work of creation and the idea of the Sabbath as a day of rest and union with God...Jesus is presenting himself as the one who can safely lead burdened humanity to rest” (p96)

In Jesus’ life, he lives out the Torah; he brings us the heart of the Law – mercy in his teaching, healing in his outreach ministry. Therefore, Jesus has become a new Law for us. In following Jesus, the authoritative interpreter of the Torah, we are not just following a set of rules and regulations, but a fully God and fully human person – Emmanuel: God is with us.

Something to pray and ponder

In what ways do I over concentrate on the rules and regulations and not the heart of the matter?
In what ways Jesus is calling me to relax, let go, and do only what I can manage in my human conditions?

Ponder on how taking Jesus’ yoke and burden is related to his gift of rest.
