From the desk of Fr Thang:

2014 Christmas Message



Paul Kelly's *How To Make Gravy* is an authentic Australian folk carol. Of course, this song is in the spirit of the early white settlement, made up largely of convicts and criminals! In his 2010 memoir, also called *How To Make Gravy*, Kelly tells that it was inspired by the often-forgotten spoken prologue Irving Berlin's *White Christmas*. It ends: "There's never been such day in old LA, but it's December 24th and I am longing to be up north." Irving intensified the feeling of "Christmas by writing about not being there."

Kelly's *How To Make Gravy* is written in form of a letter. Joe, the narrator, is a prisoner who writes to his brother, Dan. It is Christmas week and Joe who usually makes the gravy at the family gathering, is separated from his family, friends and is feeling so lonely: "Won't you kiss my kids on Christmas Eve" and "I'm even gonna miss Roger 'cause there's sure as hell no one in here I want to fight." The image of Joe asking his brother to look after his family, but not to dance too close with Rita as "she's the one to save me" reveals a man who feels helpless to stop possible changes in his relationship with her.

Isaiah, who lived in the 8th century before the Birth of Christ wrote consolingly and prophetically: "The people who walk in darkness will see a great light. Those who live in a dark land, the light will shine on them." The Prophet proclaimed the coming Wonder-Counsellor and Prince of Peace and of the light and life he would bring.

Christmas arrives again here in our land with all the promises of memories and celebration. We celebrate the Birth of Jesus because the light did dawn. The Nativity of our Lord in a small humble, and poor town of Bethlehem was not only the fulfilment of God's promise, but also the dawn of a new age.

In 1996 when Paul Kelly rang Lindsay Fields who was organising a Christmas charity record about his new song *How To Make Gravy*, he said: "I have a Christmas song... but it doesn't have a chorus and it's set in prison."

How To Make Gravy does not have a chorus and it is set in prison which can describe the life of many people on many levels. Christmas is a time that we are called to connect, reconnect, build bridges among family members, neighbours, members of our three parish communities, singing the heavenly chorus: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace to all people of goodwill." During the year, I have listened to sad stories about people's inability to connect because of resentment, hurt, alienation... which all, unfortunately occur in families.

At Christmas we celebrate the marriage between heaven and earth: Jesus Christ comes into our broken world to share our human nature and so enable us to connect better with God and each other. May we reconnect all aspects of our lives: the joys and hopes, anguish and anxiety and praise God in the heavenly chorus: "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and peace to all people of goodwill."
